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Sydney, Nova Scotia A Town Seeking Hope

Have you ever found yourself aching for with hope? When you are so sure something good is just around the corner that despite the current situation, you endure and keep on going. I sometimes even finish my day smiling, knowing that tomorrow's hopes will appear. That is how I found Syndey, Nova Scotia a harbor town aching with hope.

Syndey is located on the northeast corner of Cape Breton Island. We had left the port of Halifax in sunny warm weather and arrived the next day in Syndey, having caught the tail end of the tropical storm Lee. Exiting the ship at Liberty Pier, the rain was coming down hard. But, if you turned your back, your face could stay dry because the rain was literally coming at us from the side! After a discussion of whether to weather the weather, Nancy Noreen and I decided we would walk into town.

Sydney is old, founded in 1785, incorporated in 1904 and dissolved in 1995. The largest employer, Sydney Steel Corporation closed in 2001. The discovery of a toxic orange substance oozing into basements only added to the decay and decline of this port town. The cold storm fit well with Sydney's history.

In between the blasts of rain, Nancy and I meandered our way around the city. We enjoyed visiting the world's largest Fiddle, a craft show at the local legion hall, the local historical museum, and various souvenir and shoe stores. Our final stop was the beautiful St. George's church. At each location, the people were warm and welcoming, sharing stories and hospitality with everyone.

The local historical society is located in the 120 year old dark brown brick building that was



originally the home to the Bank of Montreal. Full of artifacts from Sydney's past, the Society operates a large historical database of records. Sydney was a key entry port for many immigrants.

Having remembered that my grandmother emigrated from Germany through Canada in 1903 to meet up with my grandfather who already settled in Michigan, I had to see if there was a connection. The archivist discovered a passenger on a ship in 1903 matching my grandmother's name bringing several small children into the country. I knew my aunt was three years old and my uncle was a baby and sure enough those ages matched with the passenger list. But then, who was the 5-year-old passenger associated with my grandmother's name? Time to start my own genealogy research, I think.

Our walk back to the ship took us past St. George's Anglican Church.



Doors were open, we went in. The volunteers were dressed in 1700 period clothes and presented the history of the church in a theatrical manner. There were photos of the Queen Mum visiting the church and Prince Charles and Queen Camilla. You see, St. George's is an official place of worship for members of the Royal Family and maintains a Royal Pew. The town celebrated King Charles coronation with their own royal music and service, video tapping the event and sending it off to the King and Queen. They received a lovely portrait as a gift from His Royal Highness in return.

Two memorial tablets hang in the back of St. George's, depicting the Lord's Prayer and the Apostles Creed. In the early days, hymnals were not plentiful so parishioners would recite from the memorial tablets. The words are etched in real gold on black wooden frames. If you read carefully, there is a misspelled word in the Creed. Because of the cost of gold, no one wanted to correct the error, so the parishioners and the Royal Family read "Creator of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Chrilst."

As we walked back to the ship, we talked about how the city was preserving its past, energizing it with stories, Gaelic music and delightful volunteers. Sydney residents are aching with hope. Hope that the tourism to this beautiful island will bring back the youth that fled 50 years ago. Hope that holding onto their traditions will touch the soul who is longing for a slower pace of life. I am so glad we braved the storm and stepped off the boat to discover such a place aching for the greatness that tomorrow brings.

City of Cedar Springs and Solon Township Attempt to Forge New Agreement for Library Services

The City of Cedar Springs continues their dedicated efforts to secure a renewed agreement for library services for both City residents and Solon Township residents.

The Cedar Springs Public Library traces its roots back to 1936 when it was established as a village library, via a voted millage. In 1959, it transitioned to a city library, signifying its growth and importance within the community as the village evolved into a city. Throughout the years, the library has received funding from various sources, including city general funds, city dedicated library milages, and collaborative contracts with Solon Township.


The relationship between Cedar Springs and Solon Township began in 1985 when a formal contract for Library Services was approved by the City. The history of this library collaboration took a significant turn in 1999. At that time, the City entered into an agreement with Solon Township for library services, providing the Township with the authority to appoint three out of the seven library board members.

Over the years, several revisions were made to the agreement, with slight updates in 1992, 2001, 2005, and 2017. In the early 2000s, both communities endeavored to create a joint district library. The City passed the millage request fulfilling half of the required steps to start a joint district library. Unfortunately, Solon Township residents did not approve the required millage to bring this initiative to fruition, defeating the pursuit of a shared joint district library.

The road to partnership between Cedar Springs and Solon Township has been tumultuous. Disagreements over board representation, responsibilities, funding, and operational procedures have been reported in numerous news articles spanning the entirety of the joint endeavor.

In March of 2022, the Cedar Springs Library Board recognized the need to increase funding for the library. The library board requested that the City increase the library millage to the maximum amount as permitted by law. The increase made the inequity in the contributions of City residents versus Solon Township residents obvious. As of December 2022, the City was paying approximately \$30.14 per resident and Solon Township was paying approximately \$12.82 per resident.

The City approached Solon Township in December of 2022, with a request to increase funding through the established Library Services Agreement from 2017. The request was to ensure the library's continued success in its newly donated building. Unfortunately, the request went unanswered. The Library did not have the necessary resources to continue to grow for what the community needed. The

budget was often very slim and didn't allow for much in the way of added services. Additionally, many programs and services had been historically sustained through donations and in-kind services. Including the City of Cedar Springs providing unpaid services for accounts payables/receivables, liability/property insurance coordination, library staff health insurance/benefits, payroll, and auditing services.

As it became clear that Solon Township was not willing to provide increased funding, the City had no choice but to initiate the cancellation of the existing agreement, aiming to negotiate a more equitable solution for both communities and ensure the success of the Cedar Springs Community Library. The six-month notice of contract cancellation was provided per the existing contract on April 13, 2023. Solon Township, however, delayed any response for several months.

With their first response on June 28, 2023. Solon Township provided a counter proposal. The primary point of contention was Solon Township's claim to three board seats. The City of Cedar Springs acknowledged this claim and, on September 5, 2023, offered a revised contract to Solon Township giving Solon Township 3 board seats as they requested. On September 6, 2023, Solon Township requested a 90-day extension to the contract cancellation. In a bid to find a timely resolution, the City of Cedar Springs agreed to a 30-day extension, pushing the deadline to November 13, 2023.

Solon Township's most recent contract proposal dated October 10,



2023, introduced the idea of allocating the tie-breaking board seat to the community providing the most funding. Concerns over this newest proposal are vast including:

- The latest proposal contradicts Solon Township's statement on June 28th, 2023 that the joint library board should be comprised of four members from the City and three from the Township.
- Solon Township does not have the ability to join any library cooperative because they do not have dedicated library millage. The City of Cedar Spring's dedicated library millage enables the library to be a member of Lakeland Library Cooperative.
- Despite incurring costs, the City has provided in-kind services for the library including accounts payables/receivables, liability/property insurance coordination, library staff health insurance/benefits, payroll, and library auditing services. This collaboration saves the library tens of thousands of dollars annually.
- The Solon Township proposal perpetuates the longstanding "tug of war" over the library by possibly modifying the composition of the board every two years.

On October 12, 2023, The City of Cedar Springs has reaffirmed its commitment to partnership and cooperation by signing a contract and awaits Solon Township's signature for a board comprising four city residents and three township residents. After the proposed three year graduated increase for Solon Township, the proposed contract will bring the estimated per person annual cost to approximately \$36.46 per person for City residents and

\$35.98 per person for Solon Township Residents (based on 2023 Taxable Values). The hope is that both communities can reach a mutually agreeable solution before the upcoming November 13, 2023 deadline.



Health Snip-it

Finishing our conversation about collagen supplementation...some of you may remember a time when making your own chicken broth was a common occurrence, where chicken bones and scraps were slowly boiled in water with a bit of vinegar added to pull the nutrients from the bones into the broth. If you noticed the consistency of the broth after it was cooled, you would note the gelatinous property of it. That was part of the collagen from the chicken cartilage. With store-bought chicken broth, there is no gelatinous property to it...it is simply flavored water. When we stopped making our own broth, we lost out of an EXCELLENT source of collagen for us, as well! Perhaps you may have even seen chicken feet (cleaned) boiled down for making collagen rich broth. [While traveling in Taiwan many years ago, I noticed that a common food in Taipei was roasted chicken feet! People would walk down the street nibbling on them, like people do with a turkey drumstick at amusement parks or from food trucks.] While eating collagen doesn't actually directly create more collagen for us, it does provide an additional source of protein that breaks down into the amino acids necessary to create our own. [A good reason to start making your own broth!] There is a concern with supplementing with collagen (the powdered, packaged kind you find in health food stores), however. Too much collagen in a day can actually lead to a deficit in tryptophan, and a decrease in tryptophan results in lower serotonin levels. This can lead to feelings of anxiety, irritability and depression. When we began supplementing with collagen powder, to add more protein to our shakes in the

Kent District Library to Ask Voters for Millage Renewal at Lower Rate

On November 7, 2023, residents in the Kent District Library service area will vote on a reduced operating millage. KDL is proposing a 10.9% operating millage reduction

If residents vote "yes," the existing millage will be renewed for 15 years at a rate that is 10.9% lower. If residents vote "no," the current millage will expire. Without millage funding, KDL will be forced to close its doors.

KDL serves 27 municipalities through a network of 20 branches. Residents in those municipalities pay a portion of their property taxes to support KDL, which makes them

eligible for a library card that gives them access to our physical and digital collections. Each KDL branch functions as a community library that serves the unique needs of its community while simultaneously enjoying the economies of scale that come from being part of a larger district library, which has greater buying power.

The proposed Kent District Library operating millage of 1.1 mills is a 10.9% reduction from the current millage rate and is estimated to:

- ♦ Save residents \$3.1 million dollars annually.
- ♦ Save residents a total of \$46.5 million over the 15-year span of the millage.

Kent District Library is able to lower its millage because we are part of a thriving and growing community where new taxable real estate has produced more revenue. This enables us to take the step of reducing the millage, which is a tax reduction for property owners.

The reduced millage will allow KDL to continue offering our current slate of programs and services – and to add new materials, programs, events and services as we have always done.

morning, we didn't know this bit of information. At first we didn't notice any side effects. However, over the course of a week or so, I noticed that I had feelings of anxiety that I had never experienced before, and my normally happy husband was irritable and quick tempered.
